**COLLEGE WIDE INITIATIVES:**

Veronica Hipolito, Dudley Gardner and Colleen Smith met with Dr. Maria Hesse, ASU Vice Provost on September 29, 2016 to discuss the ASU transfer partnership.

### **Business Process Review**

The Business Process Redesign initiative of the student processes related to recruitment, admissions, enrollment, and payment processes is in full swing, with the CampusWorks consultants returning the weeks of October 17 and 24, 2016. This process will culminate with a desired future state and a list of recommendations for improvement. The purpose of the initiative is to simplify and improve the student experience at CCC.

### **Educational Outreach**

From September 17 to October 16, 2016 the College participated in 89 Community Education Outreach events. These events included: various formal presentations from CCC staff members, Downtown Artwalk, Free Lecture Series, Open Houses, Navajo Nation Chapter House Visits, and several events which involved students, including the "Get the Scoop" events. During these events, Board members, the President, Faculty, Staff, Students and Alumni have all been involved in one way or another. This has been the most demanding time for the Community Outreach Schedule with two or three events often occurring at the same time. Overall, the reception to Prop 410 has been very positive, the community has expressed that the presentation is understandable and the information is clear to them. Community members have also expressed interest in our 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. The Official Publicity Pamphlet and the Early Ballots were also mailed out during this time.

This tremendous outreach was coordinated through Institutional Advancement but executed by many exemplary employees and volunteers at the College. Additional details on the efforts of each area are listed below.

### **Business and Administrative Services**

### Flagstaff Festival of Science

On September 24, 2016, CCC Science Faculty set up multiple demonstrations and attracted a lot of traffic at the CCC Festival of Science Booth including spiders, anatomy models, and microscope viewing. On September 30, 2016 CCC hosted science night at CCC with more than 70 people who participated in hands-on activities throughout the College. Staff and faculty attended the VIP reception for the Festival along with CCC staff and faculty members who also serve on the Festival Board. We received very positive feedback from the public about our excellent hands-on activities and organization.

### Pioneer Museum Heritage Festival

CCC Nursing and Emergency Services faculty Lori Edwards, David Cain, and David Manning as well as CCC staff members Denise Folke and Shaun McKernan manned a table for the Heritage Festival at the Pioneer Museum on October 8, 2016. The College demonstrated Fire Science and Nursing “then” and “now”.

### Deaf Expo

The students from the CCC American Sign Language Club along with American Sign Language (ASL)/Interpreting ITP faculty hosted the Northern Arizona Deaf Expo at CCC’s Lone Tree Campus on September 24, 2016. Over 150 visitors came to the event which included informational booths from agencies such as the Arizona Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, Arizona Schools for the Deaf and Blind, Arizona Hands and Voices, as well as a local Deaf artist. Workshops were offered on topics of interest to parents of deaf children, students of interpreting, and community members. Steve Hamerdinger, Director of the Office of Deaf Services at the Alabama Department of Mental Health presented two day long workshops for interpreters working in mental health settings. The Expo culminated in a Magic Show at the Coconino High School Auditorium. A Deaf magician dazzled and amused his audience which was comprised of CCC ASL and Interpreting students, and many community members.

Thanks goes out to the CCC Foundation staff for their assistance with securing an Arizona Community Foundation of Flagstaff grant, as well as the many other partners that helped to make the event such a huge success. ### Northern Arizona Community of Practice Team/Transition Fair

During the transition from the Disabilities Resource Coordinator to the HS2CCC Enrollment Coordinator, Alex Purchase remained committed to her responsibility as Chair of the Northern Arizona Community of Practice Team.

Alex collaborated with NACoPTT to bring the Transition Fair to Coconino Community College on October 6, 2016. This Fair is important to connect youth to future employers and to assist in their planning for the next step to independence. The Fair also provides a platform for them to gather that information.

The Transition Fair is a collaboration between the college and other community agencies to connect county high school students with disabilities to educational and career resources. 150 students participated as well as 29 employers, community agencies and educational support services.

### **ACADEMIC AFFAIRS:**

#### CCC OnCourse, Curios, and Reading Celebrations

CCC hosted two events to highlight the student publications *OnCourse* and *Curios*. The first event was October 7, 2016 and featured a poetry reading from Becky Byrkit and musician Jerry Riopelle. The event celebrated CCC’s 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and included readings by contributors to CCC’s *OnCourse* student publication.

The second event was October 14, 2016 and featured renowned Southwestern author Dagoberto Gilb. The event also featured contributors to CCC's *Curios* magazine. This event was highlighted by the Arizona Daily Sun as one of the highlights of the Northern Arizona Book Festival.

### **Articulation Task Force Meetings**

Articulation Task Force or ATF Meetings bring together people from around the state to ensure that CCC classes transfer between Arizona higher education institutions. CCC participated in a number of ATF meetings in September and October including the following:

- James Clark attended and was the moderator for the Allied Health ATF meeting on October 7, 2016.
- Coconino Community College is approximately halfway through our ATF travel season for Fall 2016.

### **Nursing**

CCC's nursing department is working with NAU on developing the concurrent educational program (CEP) for CCC nursing. This is a program where students complete their AAS in Nursing and BS in Nursing simultaneously.

Lori Edwards attended the Dean and Director's meeting with the Arizona State Board of Nursing on October 7, 2016. The meeting focused on program evaluations, on-boarding new faculty, and multi-generational students.

### **Dual Enrollment, Perkins, Programs of Study**

The Programs of Study State and Federal Grants have been submitted. In addition, the funding for the Perkins Grant for fiscal year 2017 was fully approved.

The Dual Enrollment, and Programs of Study staff continue to visit local area schools such as Page High School and Coconino High School.

### **Page Instructional Site**

In an effort to bring more people to the Page Instructional Site, the College has started hosting First Things First classes. This bi-weekly program focuses on developing parenting skills.

Jim Hunter met with Greg Stanfield, the Page High School Principal, and Chuck Sharp, Automotive Instructor, on September 20, 2016 to explore possibilities for additional collaborations between CCC and Page High School.

We have begun a series of meetings with community members in Page that will focus on (a) collecting feedback on possible stackable certificates for marketable skills in the areas of hotel, restaurant, and business offices, (b) providing businesses with materials and information about the upcoming Proposition 410 and exploring possibility for presentations to employee groups and (c) seeking donation commitments for our local Page Scholarships. These meetings will continue throughout October.

### **Registration and Enrollment Services**

#### **Strategic Enrollment Workgroup**

The Strategic Enrollment Workgroup continues to investigate ways to improve Academic processes and functions related to student enrollment. Two current projects relate to gathering information from students on why they drop CCC courses and the other is looking at aligning course capacities to maximize classroom utilization.

### HDE 198 –NAU Partnership Course

We would like to recognize the Registration and Enrollment Services Staff in going above and beyond in admitting and registering 458 students in a single day for the HDE 198 course that we offer in partnership with NAU. Thank you for all of your hard work and for doing whatever it takes to help our students.

### Reverse Transfer

Buffy Shirley, Credentials Evaluator, has completed the official evaluation of 111 NAU Reverse Transfer Graduate Applications. The degrees and certificates that were conferred for Spring and Summer 2016 Terms included the following:

## **BUSINESS AND ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES:**

### **Human Resources**

Two critical webpages have been added to the College website – one with information on the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and one with information and resources related to Title IX. This information enhances the level of access for the College community on important information and resources as well as ensures compliance with Federal law. Diversity employment advertising has been added to every job posting through the Arizona Daily Sun. The diversity enhancement is through Monster.com and will advertise to over 50 diversity partner sites.

The Human Resources Director position has been posted and closes on October 28, 2016. Extensive market research and comparison studies were conducted to ensure we posted a position description, title and salary that will allow us to put our best foot forward and attract a solid, highly qualified and diverse applicant pool. The process schedule provides for phone and in-person interviews from mid to late November; an offer by beginning of December, and a start date right after the holiday break. A recruitment piece was developed by HR and CCC marketing staff and was sent to over 80 colleges across the country.

### **Information Technology Services**

Students now have an easy and convenient way to change and reset their password if they have forgotten their password. ITS implemented a new feature in MyCCC that requires students to establish answers to security questions so that they can reset or change their expired password through the student portal without technical assistance. This self-service feature is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Students and employees have been provided with a security key for the wireless network at Lone Tree, Page, and Fourth Street campuses which enables them to use the service without having to reconnect several times throughout the day. Not only is it more convenient, but it improves the management of the network, enabling us to use the technology more efficiently.

Students and employees are benefitting from a doubling of the college's Internet bandwidth from 100 to 200 megabits per second. It was a timely increase as we have logged substantial increases in usage from semester to semester.

## **INSTITUTIONAL ADVANCEMENT:**

### **Marketing and Public Relations**

Public Relations provided content for a 12-page tabloid insert for the *Arizona Daily Sun*. The Fall 2016 issue of the *CCC Star* was created, printed and mailed. The issue focused on Proposition 410. A new publication, *Dine Chronicle*, featured a story about a Navajo Nation resident who graduated from CCC. The fall issue of *Cityscape* featured a story about Proposition 410. The October 2016 issue of *Flagstaff Business News* showcased a feature on Proposition 410. Public Relations provided stories and photos for articles, advertisements and one-sheets devoted to Student Success, the 25th Anniversary, and Proposition 410.

## Foundation

### **CCC Employee Giving Program**

The Foundation hosted a kick-off event for the Employee Giving Campaign with approximately 50 employees in attendance. Two scholarship recipients, President Smith, and Two Foundation Board Members addressed the group. Five new employee donors have signed up to donate to the Foundation through payroll deductions.

The Annual meeting numbers have been tallied and the Foundation netted nearly \$20,000 from the event. Most of the profit comes from sponsorships and ticket sales, and we set a record for number of donations at the event.

The Page Golf Outing has been cancelled for this year due to the small staff size in Page and the emphasis on the community education effort regarding Proposition 410. Jim Hunter has been the driving force for the golf outing in the past, volunteering many hours to organize the event. Jim is continuing with other fundraising efforts.

### **Scholarships**

A new scholarship called the Eric Pellatz Memorial Scholarship for students with disabilities was started by the Pellatz family with a \$12,000 donation. Friends and relatives have chipped in since to bring the total to \$15,000 to make this a fully-endowed scholarship. The first scholarship from this fund will be awarded in the Fall semester of 2018.

CCC2NAU Raymond Educational Foundation applications were sent to over 60 newly admitted high school students from Coconino County with GPAs of 3.0 or better. Nine applications were submitted to the CCC Foundation Office. All nine met the criteria and qualified for scholarships which were awarded in the first week of October.

### **Alumni**

The CCC Foundation was able to subscribe to WealthEngine which has a feature that aggregates data from over 60 sources to locate the current mailing address of alumni. Research was conducted on a list of over 3,000 graduates and we were able to find 1,760 who reside in Coconino County. We are mailing a letter with information about the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, alumni benefits, and Proposition 410.

The CCC Foundation hosted an alumni Happy Hour on October 5, 2016 to celebrate the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and share information about Proposition 410. Twenty people attended the event and shared stories of how CCC has had an impact on their lives.

### Student Development Program Updates

#### **Academic Advising**

Advisors served students through 1282 walk-in advising sessions and 559 scheduled appointments (including Disability Resources, Passages, Career and TRIO).

#### **CCC2NAU**

- CCC2NAU just completed 70 pathways for the 2016-2017 catalog. These pathways indicate coursework that students can take at CCC that directly match requirements of 70 degrees offered at NAU.

- Preliminary numbers for the Fall 2016 CCC2NAU participants indicates a new cohort of 419 students which is slightly higher than last fall's cohort (376).
- CCC remains the top feeder to the NAU campus of transfer students, more than any other community college in the state.
- CCC2NAU staff completed an analysis of how CCC's degree offerings match requirements of NAU's degrees.

### University of Arizona Bridge Program

The UA Bridge Launch Event was hosted by the University of Arizona on September 22, 2016 at the Lone Tree Campus.

### TAACCCT Grant

The final evaluation of the CCC2NAU program was completed and submitted to the Department of Labor as part of the TAACCCT closeout process.

This workshop, which is part of an Educator Empowerment Series, is sponsored by Sorenson Communication’s VRS Interpreting Institute. Sarah is grateful to be able to attend and interact with peers from other interpreter training programs nationwide. In addition, participants earn vital continuing education units toward maintenance of their national certification.

## **OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT:**

### **Tri Higher Education Meeting**

CCC hosted the second Tri-Higher Education Meeting on October 10, 2016. In addition to representatives from Northern Arizona University, Diné College, Navajo Technical University, and Coconino Community College, we were very pleased to welcome Navajo Nation Vice President Jonathan Nez. The Tri Higher Education initiative is working to build a partnership between these four institutions to offer more educational opportunities to our students in the Page area and other parts of Northern Coconino County. The next steps in the partnership process are for all four institutions to approve a memorandum of understanding to allow the groups to formalize their partnership.

### **President's Advisory Councils**

The President's Advisory Councils met on September 22 and 23, 2016. The Advisory Councils are formed of members of the community in the southern and northern parts of the County. We greatly appreciate the time and effort President's Advisory Council members spend in giving their feedback and ideas to the College.

### **AC4 – State/Legislative Affairs**

At its October 12-13, 2016 meeting, AC4 reviewed task force reports, discussed the pending Fair Labor Standards Act requirements, reviewed a library consortium proposal, reviewed marketing proposals for AC4, heard a presentation on educational standards, and the decision package proposal for all of the state community colleges. Dr. Smith has volunteered to serve on the Legislative Committee for AC4.

### **Phi Theta Kappa Presidential Advisory Board**

Dr. Smith has been invited to serve on Phi Theta Kappa's Presidential Advisory Board. The Presidential Advisory Board provides input into the Organization's strategic plan, priorities, and direction; advocates for PTK, its members and mission; serves as liaison between Phi Theta Kappa headquarters and the college leaders in our state; and advises PTK's Executive Director and other senior leaders.

### **Greater Flagstaff Chamber of Commerce**
